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### From Our Rabbi

"Shall I compare thee to a Summers day?" - William Shakespeare, Sonnet 18

Summer, according to the AI tool, ChatGPT, typically evokes a sense of warmth, relaxation, and enjoyment for many people. It's a season associated with vacations, outdoor activities, and longer daylight hours. For most, summer represents a break from school or work, a time to spend with family and friends, and an opportunity to explore new places or engage in favorite pastimes. It often brings to mind images of beaches, barbecues, swimming, picnics, ice cream, and other refreshing delights. Summer is a time when people embrace the outdoors, seek adventure, and create cherished memories.

While most of us may agree with these summer sentiments, Judaism adds another, more significant, layer to the mix. Smack in the middle of summer vacations, our Sages implemented a period of intense mourning. Referred to as the Three Weeks, tradition builds us up towards a crescendo, culminating with the saddest day on the Jewish Calendar, *Tisha B'Av* (9th of Av). From the Biblical spies who returned with negative reports about *Eretz Yisrael*/Israel, causing the Jewish People to wander for another 40 years, to the destruction of both Holy Temples in Jerusalem (*Beit HaMikdash*), and every other major atrocity to impact the Jewish People, *Tisha B'Av* is the day we remember, commemorate, honor, and grieve. As the Mishnah, *Ta'anit*, states "When Av enters, rejoicing is limited."

Talmud *Ta'anit* continues by saying, "The Sages taught: All mitzvot practiced by a mourner are likewise practiced on the Ninth of *Av*." There is no eating or drinking for the entire day, no excessive bathing, we remove our shoes and sit lowly on the floor, and even refrain from donning *Tefillin* (phylacteries) until the afternoon to demonstrate our grief. *Talmud* instructs us not to study Torah on *Tisha B'Av*, except for a few, specific, passages and stories that discuss details that can conjure sad emotions. Studying Torah is too much happiness to display and feel on *Tisha B'Av*!

When looking deeper, the foremost significant event commemorated on *Tisha B'Av* is the destruction of the second Holy Temple in Jerusalem, the second *Beit*. In Talmud *Yoma*, the reason for the downfall of the second Temple is questioned, especially since, at that time in history, the people "were engaged in Torah study, observance of *mitzvot*, and acts of kindness." The *Talmud* answers that, despite all the outwardly portrayed goodness, the second Temple was destroyed because "there was senseless hatred, *Sinat Chinam*." Senseless, or Baseless, Hatred could be viewed as prejudice or an unjustifiable hatred. It is hatred that does not seek the improvement of a person or situation, it is not corrective, it exists for no good reason. It finds pleasure and rejoices in the downfall, embarrassment, and pain of another person (*Midrash Eicha Rabba*). It is not about judging a particular behavior, response, or viewpoint, *Sinat Chinam* is a condemning hatred that envelops the entire being.

Rav Kook explained: "It is proper to hate a corrupt person only for his defects, but insofar as he is endowed with a divine image, this is in order to love him. We must also realize that the precious dimension of his worth is a more authentic expression of his nature than the lower characteristics that have developed in him through his circumstances." The Jerusalem Talmud, *Yoma*, admonishes: "Any generation in which the Temple is not rebuilt, it is considered as if they themselves destroyed the Temple." What exactly is keeping the third Temple from being rebuilt, generation after generation? It is nothing other than our continuousness of *Sinat Chinam*/Baseless Hatred. We are still plagued and, therefore, guilty, too.

Tisha B'Av reminds us that we have not fully healed, evolved or processed out of our own personal hatreds and prejudices. Humanity, as a whole, has not, yet, moved past Sinat Chinam. At the most opportune time when we are happy, relaxed, and celebrating in the sunshine, we are also called upon to stare directly at our flaws. We do not simply remember by taking a few moments of silence or by the reading of a sad poem. Judaism asks us to genuinely feel the discomfort of a still imperfect world for an entire day, led up to by the three previous weeks of preparation, in a way so dramatic that its effects should be penetrating and lasting.

In the famous words of Rebbe Nachman of Breslev, "If you believe that we can break, believe that we can repair." May we be blessed to heal and repair any and all *Sinat Chinam* within us individually and may we witness the same throughout all of humanity, throughout the whole world! May we experience the rebuilding of the third and final Holy Temple in Jerusalem and, in the words of the prophet, Zechariah (8:19), turn all our days of fasting and mourning into days of "joy and gladness, and cheerful seasons!" Amen!

## **Message from our President**



One of the many things that being Jewish has taught me is that I have a culture, and that culture is part of my identity. Through my experience with traveling, going to public schools in Pittsburgh, and various other things like going to summer camp, I have come across many cultures. With every culture I have learned about, I witnessed similarities that we shared. Every time someone shared a part of their cultural identity with me, I felt like a gap between what I knew about them and their actual life had been filled in. And through all the traditions, the holidays, the beliefs of Judaism and the Jewish culture in general that I have learned about, experienced, and embraced, I learned that I too, an American white male, a Jew, have a culture and something that I may not show on a day-to-day basis, but that is special to me and that I hold close in my life.

For example, while growing up Jewish I never really deeply thought about my belief in G-d. I never really asked myself if there's anyone above me, if there was a higher power, because frankly I really didn't know what I believed. I didn't know who I was praying to at services, but at the same time I didn't necessarily think that there was no one. Sometimes I would even ask for things in my head, like hoping the Steelers would win the game. I would say in my head, "please, please let them win." While growing up in the 60's the Steelers stunk but in the 70's they won 4 super bowls. So maybe it just took G-d a little more time to hear me praying.

But who was I asking? God was so interactive with the Israelites in the Torah. Where is G-d today? Judaism can be viewed from many different angles and with different interpretations. Not every Jew is the same. If they were, none of us would have evolved and we would all still be like Moses in Sinai. But we live in a modern society, and so the teachings that we learned from the past are meant to be questioned. In Conservative Judaism, we are encouraged to question and to wrestle with the "laws" that we have been taught to shape our own beliefs.

For the last 12 years I have been connected to the TBJ community. It has brought me closer to understanding Judaism and to other Jews that I have met. When I was at Public School, JCC's and summer camp, I interacted with other Jews there and learned about their Jewish identities. Most were like me but some were more religious. Some went to Shabbat services regularly. Some of my friends knew the prayers, songs, candle lighting, and grape juice with Challah, but this was foreign to me. It was not the way I grew up. My family celebrated Passover, Hanukkah, and High Holidays and practiced the traditions associated with those holidays. There was always a connection. But I did not appreciate their significance at the time. I am thankful for the privilege of experiencing those connections. I came back to Judaism when Sallee and I had kids. Overall, Judaism has taught me a multitude of lessons throughout my early adult years, and continues to teach me as I live my life. Whether I chose this religion to be only something that I was born with or whether I choose it to be something that I always carry around in my back pocket, it will always be a part of me. I hope it has taught me kindness, respect, love and how to make decisions in today's society. So, throughout all the ups and downs of my roller coaster life, I will always remember that I'm Jewish, and that Temple B'nai Jacob has played a significant role in shaping that identity. I hope to continue experiencing the joyful and happy times of Judaism in the future.

Take it from me, it's not too late for anyone to come back to Judaism.



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
